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A standard of proof is a legal or evidentiary threshold of certainty or evidence needed to establish a particular fact or claim in a legal proceeding. Levels of standard of proof vary. In relation to preventive detention, standards of proof are often as follows (from highest to lowest):

- Proof evident, presumption great
- Clear and convincing
- Preponderance of the evidence
- Judicial discretion

Presumptions

Presumptions are when a judge must presume a certain outcome unless evidence and arguments are sufficient to rebut such presumption. There can be presumptions of release or of detention, often limited to specific offenses.

Automatic Reviews or Reconsideration

An automatic review or reconsideration for bail, when someone continues to be detained, is a legal process that mandates a periodic reevaluation of the detention decision to ensure it remains justified, typically based on new evidence or changed circumstances.

Other Considerations

Some jurisdictions require a demonstration that no set of conditions could mitigate the risk of flight or danger to public safety if the individual were to be released.

Speedy Trial Considerations

Speedy trial is a legal principle that guarantees a prompt and timely resolution of a criminal case. If someone remains in custody, speedy trial is often a shorter timeframe that ensures the defendant is not held in pretrial detention for an extended or unjustified period.
